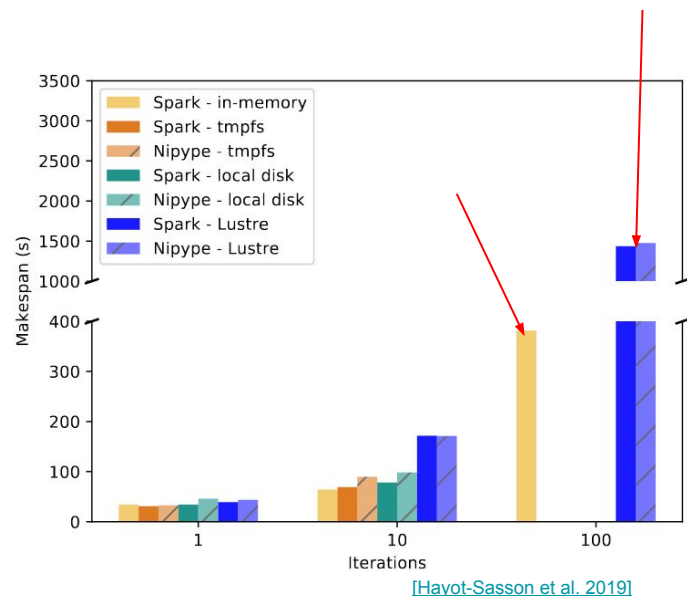




A hierarchical file system for efficient pipeline processing on HPC

Introduction

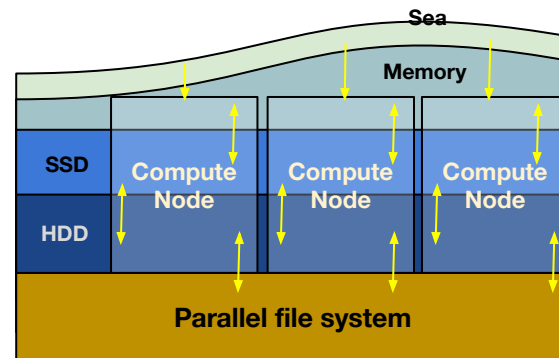
- High-resolution neuroimaging data becoming increasingly popular
- Process data on HPC using portals (e.g. CBRAIN)
- Data accessed from costly shared parallel FS (e.g. Lustre)
- Big Data file systems reduce I/O costs through:
 - Data locality
 - In-memory computing



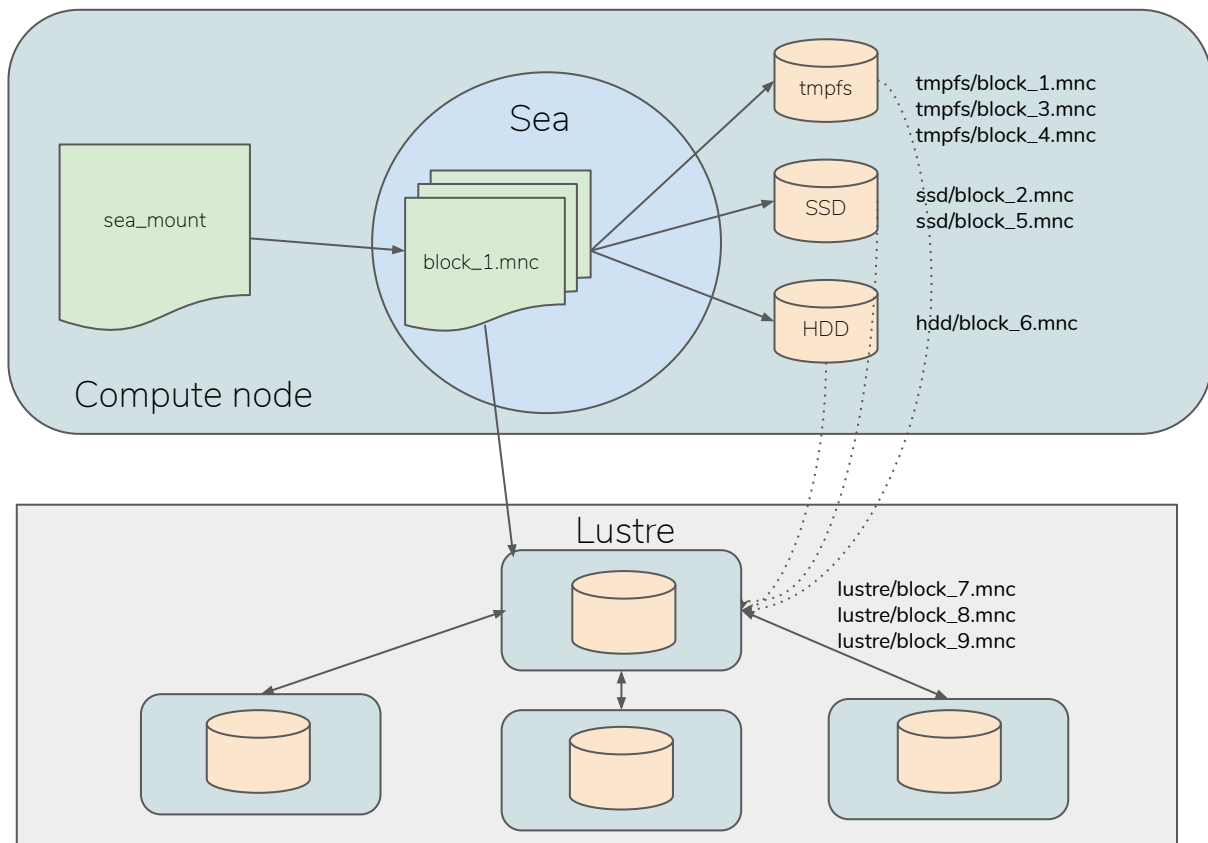
Objective: Incorporate Big Data optimizations in neuroimaging pipelines without instrumentation

Methodology: The Sea filesystem

- Lightweight library intercepting libc calls through LD_PRELOAD
- Access to filesystem enabled via mountpoint
- User-specified file system hierarchy
- Can be in-memory or with flushing to shared fs

Preliminary results

Experiment:

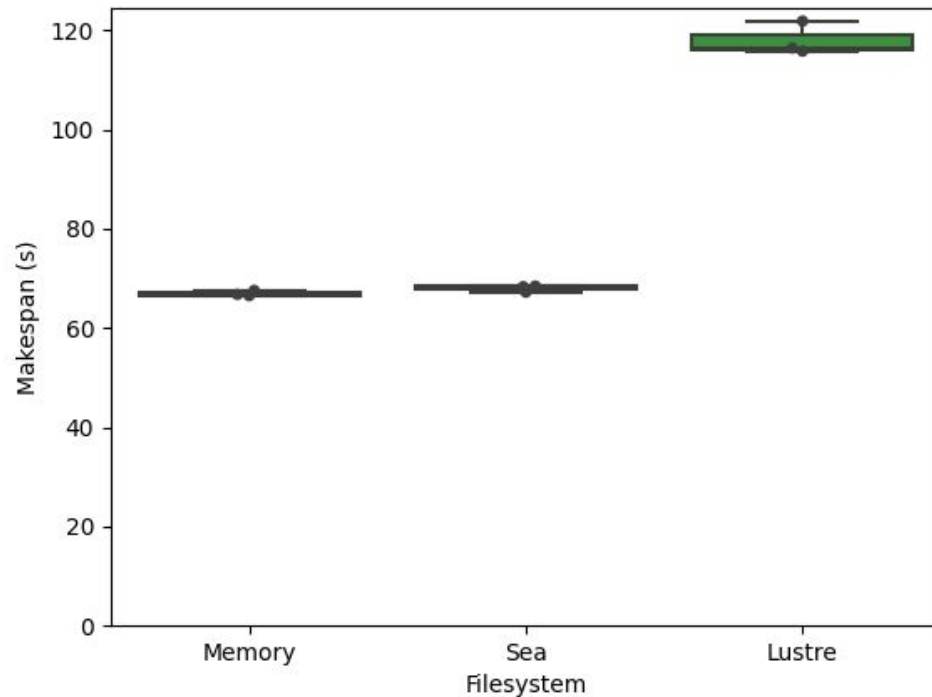
- Incremented the value of a 617MiB Big Brain block 20x
- First read always on Lustre

Infrastructure:

Shared lab cluster with 126GB tmpfs on each node

Sea and Memory (tmpfs) performance **comparable**

Sea speedup ~2x Lustre
